the Santa Claus narrative completely. Rather, the child/adult takes what they learn about the background story and symbols of the Santa Clause myth and reinterprets the story in such a way that it retains some degree of relevance and meaning even though the original understanding no longer holds.

as if we start over with a new slate on January 1 onto which we can write whatever story we want. Surely, the New Year will be better than the last. But experience teaches us that rarely is this true; the ole year gets carried over into the New Year. The hope and good news of a new year pretty quicky crash on the rocks of reality.

So, how do the Gospel narrative and Ricouer's concept help us? I think both allow us to hold on to the message of hope, even in the middle of a messy and tragic world. Ricouer would remind us that, time is not automatically redeemed just because the calendar changes; but the hope that it can be redeemed remains. The Gospel narrative, if we read further, shows us that Herod cannot ultimately thwart God's work. The way to redemption may lead through pain, and will involve struggle, but the faithful will see God's salvation.

HAPPY NEW YEAR?

This Sunday's Gospel Lesson begins with joy and celebration, but ends with slaughter and exile.

Wise men from the East have followed an unusual star, one they understood to mark the birth of the King of the Jews. Guided by the star and advice from Herod's sages, they come to Bethlehem. There they offer their gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh while homage to the newly born king.

Warned by an angel not to go home by way of Herod's palace, they take an alternative route. When Herod learns they have not returned to report the location of Jesus' birth, he is infuriated and orders the murder of all the children in Bethlehem age two and under. Warned of Herod's treachery by an angel, Mary and Joseph take Jesus and flee to Egypt, where they live as refugees until Herod dies.

What kind of beginning is this to the story of God's redemptive ministry in Jesus Christ? The beginning of Matthew's Gospel is filled with hope and good news—God is coming! God will be with us! But then Herod, in a fit of rage, pushes God out of Promised Land, out of the midst of God's own people, and makes God an alien presence in a foreign land. What kind of good news story is this?

Paul Ricouer, in his three-volume work entitled *Time and Narrative*, outlines a theory he calls "the second naivete." Ricouer invites us to a reading of texts and events that causes us to move beyond our initial impressions or even beliefs. For example, a child is taught early on to believe in Santa Claus. The narrative of a jolly old man bringing gifts to good little boys and girls becomes a guiding narrative for many years. Then the child learns that Santa Claus is not a real person, and it is their parents that put the presents under the tree.

What does the child do? Ricouer argues that the child/adult need not dismiss
