First Baptist Church on America soil. His untiring advocacy of the absolute separation of church and state, not only echoed historic Baptist principles, but it provided the basis, over 150 years later, for the inclusion of the First Amendment to the U. S. Constitution.

Williams charged Winthrop, who had been his mentor, and the rest of the colonial Puritan leadership of abrogating the central message of the Gospel, that being—God will not coerce the conscience, but will seek by all loving means to bring people into a renewed fellowship with God and with God's people.

He contended that, since the coming of Jesus Christ, God would no longer work through one nation or people to fulfill his redemptive work in the world. Rather, the community of disciples of Jesus Christ would be a world-wide, inclusive community, where all stood on equal ground before God.

It is the church, Williams argued, that is the city set on a hill, not any government or nation. It is the church's calling to spread the Gospel to the whole world by the same loving, compassionate means employed by the one who calls us to follow him.

The year was 1630. John Winthrop and a group of Puritan dissenters within the Church of England were preparing to board the Arabella for the shores of North America, where they hoped to build a new life, free from persecution and able to build their vision of the church and the true Christian community. Before they set out on their journey, Winthrop delivered a lecture entitled, "A Model of Christian Charity."

Toward the end of that lecture he quoted the words from Matthew 5:14, "You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid." Winthrop sought to warn the congregation that their experiment would be as "as a city upon a hill, the eyes of all people are upon us, . . .So that if we shall deal falsely with our God in this work we have undertaken and so cause him to withdraw his present help from us, we shall be made a story and a byword through the world."

Unfortunately, Winthrop's words quickly became the watchword for a kind of Puritan/American exceptionalism that allowed them to persecute those who did not hew to the party line, as well as perpetrate unspeakable injustice and carnage on the Native peoples who refused to convert to Christianity. Their vision of the Kingdom of God on earth, quickly devolved into a version of the Kingdom that Jesus would not recognize.

One of the dissenters against their vision of this Puritan exceptionalist vision was Roger Williams, who started out as part of the Puritan dissent from the Church of England. When he arrived in the colony of Massachusetts, he soon found himself at odds with the Puritan leaders there. He argued that their vision of Christendom ran counter to the message of the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

Forced into exile, Williams would settle in the area around what we now know as Providence, Rhode Island. There he sought to found a community where everyone was free to worship (or not worship) God according to the dicatates of their conscience. Not only is he known as the founder of Rhode Island, but he
