



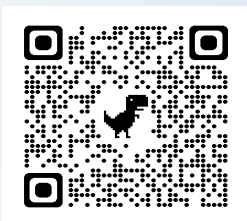
FREE TAX AIDE FROM AARP CONTINUES THROUGH APRIL 15

Jim's Jottings

All this is from God, who reconciled us to himself through Christ and has given us the ministry of reconciliation

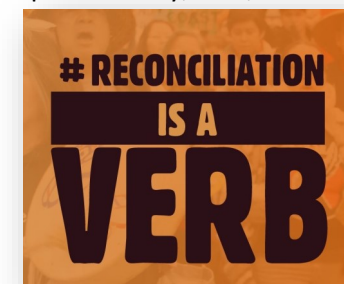
2 Corinthians 5:18 NRSVU

When I opened my first checking account, I was taught how to reconcile my checkbook to the bank statement. This often tedious process is meant to insure that we have an accurate picture of our financial status. It involves taking two different balances—the one on the bank statement and the one in my checkbook—and harmonizing them into a number that reflects the reality of the situation in the present moment.

We often connect peacemaking and reconciliation. In that sense to engage in reconciliation is to bring two warring or disputing persons together, establishing a new relationship, that may or may not reflect the contours of the original relationship. Anyone who has engaged in this process knows that it is hard work. It involves finding some common ground on which both parties can stand as they work to (re)build their relationship.

I believe this is one dimension of what The Apostle Paul is talking about in 2 Corinthians 5:16-20, where he proclaims, "God was in Christ reconciling the world to himself." Jesus Christ, the one in whom God is present in a singular human being, becomes the common ground on which God and human meet and through whom a new relationship, a new covenant is formed. In the unique person of Jesus, God meets humanity and, "as Paul states, "So if anyone is in Christ, there^{is} a new creation: everything old has passed away; look, new things have come into being!"

God did not effect this work of reconciliation by sitting on a throne in the heavens and issuing edicts and proclamations. God got directly involved in human affairs as one of us. In no sense does God play it safe. The work of reconciliation was and is risky for God, but out of great compassion for us, God has been willing to engage in this risky behavior.

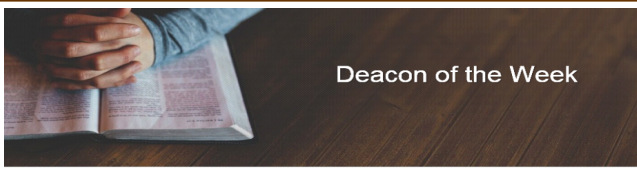

And thanks be to God that God has been willing to engage in this risky, sacrificial work of reconciliation.

But the work of reconciliation is not something God alone engages in. According to Paul, we have been given this ministry to enact in our lives and our world.

We are called to engage in the work of bringing into harmony those who are at odds, out of sync, even engaging in hostilities with one another. We are called to be the meeting place where people can find new life with God, and with each other.

This means that we need to be willing to engage in personal acts of reconciliation. This Lenten season, we need to ask: are there persons with whom I need to forge a new, harmonized relationship? Will I take the risk?

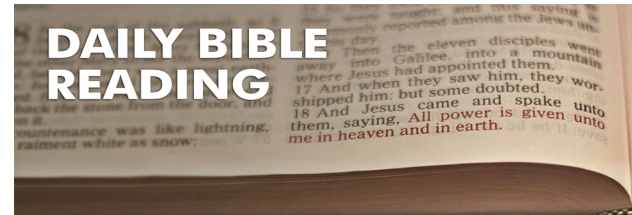
