Every Summer, the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship sponsors *Extreme Build*, during which a home is built in less than two weeks for a family in one of the poorest areas of Kentucky.

Begun as a part of the Rural Poverty Initiative of the national Cooperative Baptist Fellowship, this local endeavor has built 17 houses for residents of McCreary County, in partnership with Highland Housing, a non-profit housing development group in Eastern Kentucky. Volunteers from Kentucky, Tennessee, and other places come to make this project work.

But more than building a house, this two-week project pumps needed income into the area as volunteers stay in local hotels, eat at local restaurants, and purchase materials from local merchants.

Civil Rights leader, John Lewis, encouraged people to get involved in “good trouble, necessary trouble” in order to provoke the country to more just treatment of its Black citizens and to fulfill its promise to be a nation of “liberty and justice for all.” Lewis understood that powerful people and interests rarely volunteer to give up their power or privilege out of the goodness of their hearts. Those in the struggle for freedom and justice have to engage in acts that upset the status quo, making it difficult, if not impossible to engage in business as usual. So that is what the leaders of the Civil Rights Movement did; they engaged in demonstrations, strikes, sit-ins, and other acts of civil disobedience and social disturbance in order to call attention to both the injustice in the social structure, but to possible solutions.



In her sermon, which closed this year’s Spring Gathering of the Cooperative Baptist Fellowship of Kentucky, Lauren McDuffie spoke of acts of “holy disruption” engaged in by Jesus, the apostles, and the early church. She contended that, as followers of Jesus Christ, we are called engage in acts of holy disruption as part and parcel of our witness to the Gospel. After all, at the heart of the Gospel is the call to repent because the Kingdom of God has come near, or has been inaugurated in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus. We pray, as Jesus taught, for the Kingdom of God to “come on earth as it is in heaven.”



Early Christians were known as disturbers of the peace. In Act 17, Paul and Silas are hauled before the assembled leaders in Thessalonica and accused of “turning the world upside down” and “acting contrary to the decrees of the emperor, saying that there is another king named Jesus.” For far too long, I fear, the church has seen its role in society as the keeper of the peace, the moral foundation of the status quo, the conservator of society’s values. To the extent that we are content to play that role, I believe we have surrendered our true calling. Jesus did not leave the church behind to make the world run more smoothly, or keep the trouble-makers at bay. He sent us into the world to proclaim God’s intention to create something new in the world.

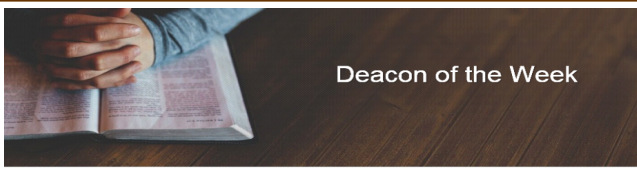

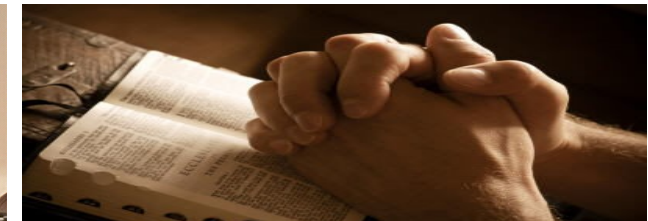
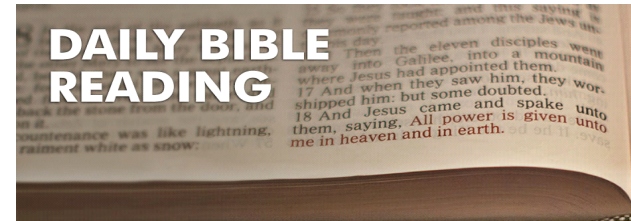
PRAYER GUIDE
