In 1921, President Biden signed into law legislation making Juneteenth a Federal Holiday. This national celebration, coming just over two weeks before that July 4th holiday, gives us an extended period to ponder the meaning of freedom, as well the work that still need to be done for all people in this nation to realize the benefits of freedom.

In other news . . .

At this year's annual meeting of the Southern Baptist Convention, four distinct, yet related actions were taken by the Messengers that unequivocally sent a message about who was eligible to provide leadership to Southern Baptist Churches.

The first involved deciding the fate of two churches' relationship to the SBC—one of those churches being Fern Creek Baptist Church here in Louisville. Earlier this year the Executive Committee of the SBC declared that Fern Creek was no longer in "friendly cooperation " with the Convention, effectively expelling them. Pastor Linda Barnes went to this year's SBC annual meeting to ask the Messengers re-instate the church. The church lost their appeal by a 90% vote.

The second was a resolution on the role of women in fulfilling the Great Commission. After citing a long list of women in the Bible who played significant roles in moving the purposes of God forward (including many who served as leaders/teachers), the resolution referenced the 2000 Baptist Faith and Message, which directly excluded women from the pastoral role. It then encouraged churches to nurture, prepare, and use women in advancing the Great Commission, with one important exception—no women in pastoral roles. Those are limited to men only.

The third could have profound implications

for churches aligned with the SBC who do not have women in the senior pastor role.

At last year's convention, Pastor Mike Law from Virginia introduced a motion to amend Article III, Section 1 of the Constitution of the Southern Baptist Convention. Section 1 provides a description of what it means to be in "friendly cooperation" with the SBC.

Law's proposed amendment would add language to paragraph 1, which currently reads: Has a faith and practice which closely identifies with the Convention's adopted statement of faith. (By way of example, churches which act to affirm, approve, or endorse homosexual behavior would be deemed not to be in cooperation with the Convention.)

Law's proposed amendment would add: *Does not affirm, appoint or employ a woman as a pastor of any kind* following the reference to endorsing homosexual behavior.

This means that churches who call any woman serving on staff 'pastor' would be deemed not in friendly cooperation and removed from participating in the SBC. Law argued that the current language of the Baptist Faith and Message is vague enough that it could possibly be read as referring only to the senior pastor role. He felt it necessary to clarify that the prohibition extends to any pastoral role.

It was approved overwhelmingly, but needs a confirming vote at next year' SBC meeting.

The fourth had to do with a change in the Baptist Faith and Message 2000. On the surface it may seem nitpicky, but it works in service of Law's proposed constitutional amendment. The change goes to great lengths to argue that there are only two biblical offices in a New Testament Church: pastor and deacon, and that biblical standards should be Strictly applied to both. Thus anyone with the title pastor, can only be a man.

JUNETEENTH: A CELEBRATION OF FREEDOM

On June 19, 1865, two months after Robert E. Lee surrendered to Ulysses S. Grant, and over two and a half years after President Abraham Lincoln issued the *Emancipation Proclamation*, Union General Gordan Granger marched into Galveston, Texas. Shortly after entering the city, he discovered 250,000 enslaved people who had been effectively freed by the *Emancipation Proclamation*, and actually freed by the end of the Civil War.

Even though they were free, and officials in Texas knew they were free, no one had bothered to inform them that they were no longer enslaved. Consequently,


General Granger issued General Order Three, which reads: "The people of Texas are informed that, in accordance with a proclamation from the Executive of the United States, all slaves are free. The result is an absolute equality in personal and property rights between slaves and former masters."

Not until Federal Troops arrived in Galveston did those who had been liberated know of their new status; not until that moment were the officials in Texas forced to acknowledge that they had lost the war and could no longer enslave people for their own gain.

In 1866, celebrations of the liberation of the slaves in Texas took place all over the state. Within a few

years, June 19th celebrations were taking place across the country. For the community of former slaves, June 19th became the day that marked their liberation from oppression within the land that had won its freedom from Britain 82 years earlier.

Juneteenth is a reminder that freedom from oppression does not come easily. Those with power rarely let go of that power and control without a struggle. Even when they lose the struggle, the powerful are loath to let go. They will try every way they can to maintain power and control, as well as to regain it once lost.
